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## Course description

This course provides a hands-on introduction to experimental data collection concerning meaning in language. A range of methodological aspects will be covered, from identifying a research question and a falsifiable null hypothesis, to determining how different experimental paradigms (e.g., acceptability judgment, inference tasks, picture selection, etc.) can be used to test different hypotheses. The empirical domain will include different semantic and pragmatic phenomena, such as presupposition, implicature, mass/count distinction and aspect, semantic composition in the nominal and verbal domain, etc. across different populations (L1, L2, early vs. late learners of signed languages, bilinguals, adults with different social skill measures). As part of this course, students will also be introduced to some of the basic tools used in experimental design. The course aims to prepare students to design their own experiments to collect original data, and to place students in a strong position to critically evaluate empirical claims.
