Course description and learning goals

Course Abstract

In this class, we will learn how to apply the mindset and the skillset of a linguist to various non-standard objects, including aspects of human communication that have been traditionally overlooked in formal linguistics such as different types of gesture; non-linguistic systems, such as pictorial and video representations, music, dance, etc.; and animal communication. In the process, the students will gain a deeper understanding of cognitive universals that underlie both linguistic and non-linguistic behavior in humans, as well as hone their knowledge of linguistic notions and theories.

Learning objectives

- 1. The students will get familiarized with the so-called "Super Linguistics" research program that applies linguistic methodology to a diverse range of non-standard objects in order to gain a better understanding of cognitive universals that underlie human behavior.
- In the process, the students will strengthen their knowledge of various analytical tools in linguistics by seeing how they can be used beyond their standard applications and thus gaining a deeper understanding of the abstract core insights underlying those tools.
- 3. While working on their final paper, the students will hone their independent research skills (such as identifying a research question that is appropriate in scale, situating their research question within the existing research, making empirical generalizations in ways that lead to analytical insights, etc.), as well as their academic presentation and writing skills.
